

Studies found that

(Abbott & McKenna, 2000; Bellringer, 1986)

1/3 of prisoners were considered problematic or pathological

(Williams, Royston & Hagen, 2005)

Gambling activities are prevalent in the prison setting although they are forbidden

(Abbott & McKenna, 2000; Bellringer, 1986)



Remand education program is an 8-week program which aims to

- Raise Asian prisoners' awareness of gambling harm
- Reduce the likelihood of Asian prisoners using gambling to manage stress
- Relieve Asian prisoners' stress & anxiety
- Improve Asian prisoners' skills, for example, communication skill, positive thinking, etc

Methodology of program evaluation


- A 5-item evaluation form was distributed to the participants after each program
- They consisted of statements such as "Duration/時間段適合嗎", "Facilitator's approach/輔導員的方法.", etc.
- An open question asking the participants to provide additional comments or suggestions at the end of questionnaire.
- Total 70 completed forms were collected during the period from May 2017 to April 2019.




- Facilitators could clearly explain the content
- Facilitators are professional, patient, friendly and helpful






- High-stress environment




- Not long enough to make their time go faster





Correspondence Program

Give a man a fish – that can feed him for a day Teach a man to fish – that can feed him for life





How it works?

- Correspondence program is a kind of long-distance learning
- The prisoners will receive a set of reading and exercise
- After they study the reading, they can do the exercise to test their knowledge
- They will mail the completed exercise to us and we will send them a new set of reading & exercise



Why the correspondence program?

- As there is no fixed program date and time, the prisoner can set their own pace of study.
- The prisoners can learn and kill time without the appearance of a facilitator.
- The prisoners can keep learning and stay in touch with the facilitators after sentence.



Literature review:

Only 1 research studying prison gambling prevention and awareness program

- The program comprised a series of six 90-minute group sessions and was offered to inmates serving their sentences in Canada
- The study suggested that programs of this kind can be effective for inmate populations, particularly in changing attitudes towards gambling.
- After participating in the program, inmates no longer believed that gambling was a simple recreational activity.



We have currently designed 8 sets of reading & exercise

- Self-assessment of gambling harm.
- What gambling is.
- What problem gambling is.
- The "good side" and the "not so good side" of gambling.
- The contributing factors of gambling addiction
- Gambling myth.

Strengths & Limitations

- The correspondence programmed was served as the only program within
- the prison during the pandemic
- The correspondence program allows participants to attend at their own pace and as many times as they prefer
- The participants cannot seek immediate help from the facilitators
- The current correspondence program is only available in Chinese
